

Update on the Nationwide Monarch CCAA for Energy and Transportation Lands

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Innovative New Model for Conservation

- The first nationwide CCAA
- Supported by over 40 industry partners
- Values cross-sector collaboration
- Completed on the fastest timeline of any such agreement





- > The goal of this CCAA is to encourage participation in voluntary conservation on energy and transportation lands that results in a net benefit to monarchs.
- > The conservation potential of the Agreement aspires to the enrollment of up to 26 million acres of energy and transportation lands contributing over 300 million stems of milkweed and 2.3 million acres of monarch foraging habitat, over the coming decades.



- > September November 2018: Internal reviews by CCAA Advisory Team
- > November December 2018: Finalized draft
- > <u>December 6, 2018</u>: Submission to USFWS
- > December 22 to January 25: Federal shutdown; initial outreach to external stakeholders

- > Intra-Service review underway
 - Conference opinion/Section 7 consultation
 - NEPA review
 - Inter-regional review
 - Headquarters review
- > Federal Register publication coming soon!
 - 60 day public comment period
 - Targeting mid-March to mid-May



If decision is:

- > To list as Threatened or Endangered
- > Not Warranted, no listing
- > To list as "Warranted, But Precluded"

CCAA brings value through:

- > Regulatory assurance and incidental take coverage
- > Certainty amidst potential challenges
- > Certainty and consistency; possibility to contribute to (or preclude the need for) future listing decisions
