

Protecting & Restoring Habitat

Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie Wilmington, IL

- Largest protected open space in northeastern Illinois
- Native production gardens produce seeds of native grasses & wildflowers
- Native seed also collected from local IDNR natural areas by permit
- Seed is harvested, cleaned, processed, & planted
- Select native seed obtained from specialized plant nurseries from local provenance zones
- Volunteers contribute time & labor throughout the year

Conservation partners extend along the flyways throughout the United States, Mexico, & Canada



Working at the International Level

Highlighted Project: Community-Level Oak Conservation in MBBR

Workshops provide instruction in:

- Selection of oak seed for germination
- Propagation techniques & monitoring of seedlings
- Initial focus on riparian zones at lower elevations
- 85 total participants from 43 institutions including government agencies, NGOs, universities, & ejidos
